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Message Stick ABC TV – Outstanding Achievement in Television

Message Stick won this year's Deadly for Outstanding Achievement in Television. Each week, the half hour episodes explore stories relating to Indigenous Australians. On Sunday November 1, Message Stick screened Before Galileo, where Wardaman Senior Elder Bill Yidumduma Harney talked about the spiritual and practical significance of reading the night sky.

Begore Galileo

In the International Year of Astronomy, astronomers world-wide are celebrating the 400th anniversary of Galileo turning a telescope to the sky. But way before Galileo, Aboriginal Australians had a sophisticated cosmology linked to their Dreamtime beliefs and creation stories.

From Menngen, near Katherine in the NT, Wardaman Senior Elder Bill Yidumduma Harney was raised by Wardaman lore men and women in the bush during the assimilation era and taught the spiritual and practical significance of reading the night sky.

While non-Indigenous astronomers study the Milky Way, Indigenous people talk about the Emu in the sky. Early in the year you'll just see its head, and the little star in the Southern Cross is the eye of the emu. As the months go by the emu gets bigger and bigger.

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When you see the whole emu and it's lying down, that's when the emu is laying eggs and sitting on the nest. Watching the Milky Way tells us when the emus are laying and when they're nesting and that's when we go out for emu egg hunting season.


