Djirruwang Program offers pathway to help community tackle mental illness.

BORIGINAL MENTAL HE ALTH TRAINEE KRISTEN ELLA IS PASSIONATE ABOUT HELPING HER PEOPLE AND CHARLES STURT UNIVERSITY'S (CSU) DJIRRUWANG PROGRAM IN WAGGA NSW IS HELPING HER ACHIEVE HER GOALS.

Kristen is undertaking a Health Science (Merital Health) degree and is interring with Pyde Community Merital Health Centre in Sydney as part of her degree through (SU

The Djirnuwang Program Is specifically designed for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people to gain high quality knowledge, skills and attitudes in the field of merital health. This is adhieved by building on student's knowledge and combining mental health theory with dinical practice.

"The Djimuwang Program provides the opportunity for Aboriginal peopleto help close the gap for our people,"Kristen says

"As we know there is a life expectancy gap of around 20 years, the aim of the program is to educate and employ Aborginal people in the Government sector so we can help our people receive treatment and also to prevent any illness. "I notice in my work, as do other Aboriginal Health Workers that Aboriginal people are more likely to visit a health care centre where an Aboriginal person is present."

Kirsten's experience is that her people will also open up more and generally feel more comfortable with Aboriginal Health Workers.

She first became interested in the area of mental health from her dad who is an Aboriginal Drug and Alcohol worker.

"Wy diad found the program, as I was going to study social work, however the program is Aborginal specific and you end up with a Health Science degree," the says.

The course is a marture of practical and theoretical learning over three years. Rudents attend COM four times a year and during the year submit assignments when they are not in the workplace doing the on the job' component of the degree.

This mix suits Kristen.

"I'm more of a practical learner and i like to physically do something and not just read about it," she says.

Kirsten decided to undertake her practical training at Ryde Community Mental Health Cantre for two reasons. The centre has a good reputation within the mental health care industry, and it's also dose to Kirsten's home on the Central Coast of NSW.

T find a lot of mental health problems in our people item from prejudice and ration in their early lives, and they carry that negative. There is also drugs and alcohol involved as well, in almost 100 per cent of cases.

Our culture is so significant and people forget we are the First Australians and there is a lot of history there... and so many issues with Aboriginal health and chooric disease. Aboriginal people need to help other Aboriginal people."

Kesten's passion for working in merital health to help her people his: got her through the tough times during her degree when study and work have been hard going.

Tt's not always been easy - you need time management and you also need to take time out for yourself but I have a passion to work in Aboriginal mental health," she says.

She's in the third year of her degree but hopes to continue to study after she's finished.






