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

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On October 8, a new website will be launched to help in the battle against rates of smoking in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities. The site complements a range of new interactive classroom activities that incorporate videos and games. For schools without adequate internet access, a DVD with all the multimedia content is also available. Lessons also include a 'Smoking and Your Body' bingo game to learn about the body parts damaged by smoking, and an activity that teaches about the relationship between nicotine, the brain and addiction. 5. Off the walls

A rich and diverse collection of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander art, gathered over almost 40 years by Australian Government agencies responsible for Aboriginal affairs, goes on display from this month at the National Museum of Australia in Canberra. Off the Walls: Art from Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Affairs Agencies 1967–2005 draws from the ATSIAAC collection of more than 2000 objects, including bark paintings, water colours, carvings, basket and fibre work, spears, sporting trophies and posters. The collection is now called the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Affairs Art Collection. Admission is free.

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

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


