
The first thing Chris did after returning from Sydney to collect his award was to throw a pizza party for the kids, and a lunch for his hardworking staff.

he Donovans have been playing together for longer than they can remember. Ask them when their first gig was, and you'll prompt some communal head-scratching. But they do remember what their first gig was like.

"It was a Fire Brigade ball in Mt Druitt," Michael recalls, "and we forgot our microphone stands.

"We didn't know what we were going to do, as we all play instruments and couldn't hold our mics. So we got three wire coat hangers and hung 'em around our necks with a hook for the mic and played that way – no problems."

The Donovans have come a long way



since those early days of improvisation. They took home this year's Deadly for Band of the Year, and have a fan base that stretches across the entire country.

"We played about 300 gigs this past year," says Merv. "That's not many nights off, but we love it – we wouldn't be doing it if we didn't love it. We love to stay in touch with the community and to share our music with them."

And is a gig with the entire Donovan clan on the cards?

"Well, I launch my solo album later this year," says Michael. "I'd love it to be a family-orientated show."
